Maths:

Place value and Addition and subtraction.

- In year three we work with three-digit numbers, so they need to have an appreciation of the value of 100 and how many tens make a hundred.
- We will read and write numbers in numerals and words up to one thousand.
- We will practise counting in 50s and 100s, noticing the patterns when counting in these amounts.

Multiplication and Division

Children will develop and deepen their understanding of multiplication and division in relation to their 3, 4 and 8 times table. The will consolidate their understanding by representing facts as arrays,

History

Stone Age to Roman Conquest

We explore the Stone Age, Bronze Age, Iron Age and Roman Era whilst considering our 4 Golden Threads

Trade, Settlement, Civilisation Power.

We will investigate how humanity change over these time periods and whether or not the changes were positive.

There will be a focus on changes in technology and how this impacted survival.

We will also consider the lasting legacy of the Roman conquest and whether they left a lasting positive change

French: Our topic is "All about me". Year 3 will learn to greet, and say our name. We will explore the alphabet and the phoneme "on". We will learn to count to 20 and say how old we are.

Computing: We will be focusing on Online Safety, Computer Networks, developing their typing skills and practice inserting images and editing text,
